It was with great pride to have received messages and images/videos of our tamariki performing at the Rangitikei Cluster Cultural Festival at the end of week 1. It was brilliant seeing the tamariki proud to perform and the mixture of waiata, ukulele and guitar being so successful. Miss Coleman, Zettie and Sam have put a huge amount of effort into the progression of our students and we are very proud of the result. It will be great to share this with all our whanau at our Showcase Event at Te Matapihi in Bulls on 30 August. It will also be exciting to see the variety of class items that will be included in the performance. We also have our Kiwilele players taking part in the regional Kiwilele Jam next Friday, where we know they will be amazing.

Thank you to all those whanau who made time to connect with teachers in the Parent/Teacher conferences last week, and those who have made time to catch up with teachers at alternative times. From our online bookings, we had close to 50 percent of whanau connecting last Tuesday. For those who have not yet connected or made arrangements, our team will be touching base to establish a time to meet or have a conversation with you.

From these sessions staff have been working on getting goals onto HERO which will show students meeting goals within their curriculum level as the term progresses. Some of these goals may last a short time and others for a longer time as we make sure the students have a solid understanding. You will find these goals on the same page as reports. These goals will then create a picture for you on what your tamariki can do as a learner. We feel this will be more as the learning happens and not waiting to hear about what the students can and can't do in a report.

Last week Rooms 2, 3 and 4 went on an adventure to the Esplanade in Palmerston North with a visit to the Wild Base Recovery Centre for birds and a blast at the road safety track. This was an opportunity for students to see some of our native birds being rehabilitated and learn about what the purpose of the centre is. As a result of this trip, I know the classes have a variety of learning opportunities that are being directed by the students.

There are plenty of ideas on attracting more native birds to our kura and the potential to do some predator eradication is of interest to some of our students.

Hopefully, the weather will play its part and enable the Halcombe Sports Exchange to take place tomorrow. The students in Year 5, 6, 7 and 8 have been preparing for rugby, soccer and netball but the weather really has had an impact on these training sessions where we have had to close the field due the ground conditions. Later this term we will also participate in the Rangitikei Cluster Quad sports where hockey will also be an option. We would really appreciate parent support with taking these teams as we try to enter as many children as possible in each sport.

On Friday we had our Learning Celebration led by Room 2, and it is so special to see our youngest students support each other to take control of the presentation, help each other out when they are stuck and show their confidence and character. During term 3 we have moved these celebrations to Friday (still at 2pm) to enable more parents to attend.

For the rest of Term 3 and 4, Room 1 will have Mrs Spiers and myself teaching them together. Mrs Spiers will be in the class Monday to Wednesday and I will have the class on Thursday and Friday. We are both looking forward to this challenge and continuing the learning opportunities they already have.

Pet day: Our 2023 pet day will be on Thursday 21 September with the postponement day on Friday 22 September if required. This is to fit with whanau not having to continue feeding lambs and calves through the holiday break. We look forward to having lambs, calves, dogs, cats, chickens, worms or whatever animals our tamariki care for. There will be leading and handling awards for lambs, calves and dogs, with care and attention awards for other animals as the day goes along. This is a fun day where our tamariki get to show how they look after their pets.
