Welcome back to term 4. We hope you have had a quality two weeks with your whanau and, as we hit the ground running on Monday, the students have come back engaged and are looking forward to the term ahead. This is an exciting term with many class trips/camps and sports events. Without our amazing parent support for the upcoming camps, we would not be able to offer the experiences for our tamariki at the least impact in regards to costs to you. We work really hard to provide as many opportunities for our tamariki at little or often no cost and in today's climate, this is something we are very proud of. The support of the FOS and the hard mahi people that put in during the hay season enables so many opportunities for our students.

During the holidays, Miss Charlotte Lester has indicated she will be finishing at the end of the year to follow her partner Tom Clark-Puia to his first teaching position in New Plymouth. While this is sad for our team, school and our community, we know that the decision has taken a huge amount of thought, time and consideration on her part. As Charlotte indicated to all our staff, if she could commute, she would. Charlotte has taken on all challenges at South Mākirikiri School and we have seen her grow as a teacher, and know we have helped develop her potential as a future leader in education. As a school, we will acknowledge more of the contribution throughout this term. We know that the move for Charlotte and Tom is a very positive part of their development in education. During this term, Mr Clark-Puia is going to work alongside me in Room 1 on Thursdays and Fridays to help ease the load.

We have also installed some permanent volleyball poles and already have students out utilising this on the grass behind the playground. Kere Marino donated his

Cross-Country this Friday: We are excited to be holding the cross-country at Duddings Lake. After seeing the Whanganui Secondary Schools course there earlier in the year, we decided we should try a new local venue. We have most of the action occurring in front of the Hall as you drive into Duddings Lake. Year 4 to 8 will complete a complete circuit of the lake with some added loops for Year 6 to 8. For Year 0 to 3, the course will stay on the hall side of the lake. We would

appreciate any help keeping the students in their designated areas to watch the events and not roaming around the course. We are happy for parents to be around the lake edge to support. Times and distances are approximate:

- Year 6/7 Year 8 Girls/ Boys 1:00pm 2.6km
- Year 4/5 Girls/ Boys 1:20pm 2km
- Year 2/3 Girls/ Boys 1:40pm 1.2 km
- Year 0/1 Girls/Boys 1:50pm 700m

Students can wear mufti (athletic clothing, shoes are ideal but bare feet will be fine)

At the conclusion of the event, students will be able to leave with parents. Please advise the class teacher if you are taking your child/ren home with you.

Tonight we have four students taking part in the Marton Lions Club speech competition. We wish Ella Thomas, Ryder Jones, Georgiana Maas and Johnny Shoebridge all the best for their presentations tonight.

The calibre of speeches which were presented at school made the judging really tough. What was encouraging to see in the class presentations was the feedback and support each of the tamariki received from their peers. We had a wide range of topics being presented all driven by students interest and research.

It was also great having the year 7 and 8 finalists presenting their speeches to the whole school.

We have not set Learning Celebrations in the first seven weeks of this term, which is due to us trying an elective programme. In the senior school we have two specialist groups in Cricket Whanagnui and Golf NZ running programmes along with our teachers facilitating the six week experience for students. In the junior school there

are also electives happening across the classes based at school. This is an exciting opportunity for students to experience something they have chosen, and getting an extended amount of time doing so with expert support. We will be continuing to acknowledge recipients of the Values awards which may be on Monday mornings when we gather together as a school to attempt some fine motor skills or physical challenges to engage the mind and body.

Health and sexuality education: During term 4, classes will be exploring this aspect of the New Zealand Curriculum. Classes will (and have already) been sharing what will be part of the lessons. For this year, we are focusing on two themes, ie, Staying Safe and Relationships. As per our school policy, there is an opportunity to come in to hear how the learnig is differentiated for each year group, or through talking to the class teacher for an overview. As a school, we use the resource "Navigating the Journey" education, from the NZ Family Planning Association. We have resources dedicated to Year 1-2, Year 3-4, Year 5-6 and Year 7-8. Teachers use this resource to guide lessons. An outline of what is being taught is communicated with the year groups before we start and this is a opportunity for you, as parents, to have conversations at home about Staying Safe and Relationships.

An information hui will be held at 5:30pm on Tuesday 17th October in Room 1.

My favourite category of Pet Day is the "Other Animal" section - sooo many different species and passionate little carers of these unique beings. This day is so special to our school and a unique point of difference over other schools in our rohe/region, it is definitely something to be enjoyed and celebrated.

Community Consultation: On Pet Day, we opened our community consultation survey. This helps us to build a curriculum that is unique to South Mākirikiri's wants and needs through the voice of you - our parents, whanau and community. We asked questions about our Health and PE curriculum, our school communication, and reporting. Thank you to the NINE people that have completed the survey - we really appreciate you taking the time to share your feedback. I strongly urge the rest of you to take 15 minutes out of a busy day to help us out here - this is a constructive way to share with us what we are doing right, what opportunities we can look into, and what we can be doing better. Not to mention it's a much more effective method of creating change than car park conversations.

Friends of the School - Lead vacancy: I want to thank Alannah Marino for her time as the FOS Chairperson. Alannah agreed to take on this role as a new parent to our school community last year and has done an excellent job in the role and I have particularly appreciated her communication and organisation. Since taking on the role, Alannah has started a new job, opened a new business with husband Kerre, and is now studying for a Bachelor of Accountancy. Alannah's words to anyone considering supporting our school in this role:

"You get to work with a great team of people who are super supportive! The job can actually be a lot of fun and isn't difficult at all. It's also something you can add flair to and really inject something exciting into our school." If this sounds like something you could be interested in, or are prepared to step into for a year, please feel free to contact Alannah, Greg or myself.

While we're on the topic of FOS, we are looking for a hay coordinator for the coming hay season. Jen Simpson did a stellar job this year and Rob Simpson was outstanding prior to that. This job is essentially answering the phone from farmers who require their hay to be stacked. The hay season is usually from mid-January to early March. You need to put the call out to our school community to come to the property to load the hay onto vehicles and stack it into the sheds, ensuring we have enough people and vehicles to complete the job. This is our major fundraiser each year and we get paid \$2 per bale. In recent years we have raised between \$20,000 - \$40,000 for our students! No prior knowledge is needed, you don't even need to go to the jobs - this can be a pure logistics and communication role. However, we do have a great time at these jobs, it is a family friendly fundraiser where there is a role for everyone of all abilities, and an ice block, snack and cold drink reward at the end of the job. Again, please contact Alannah, Greg, Jen or myself if you can help us out for the 2024 hay season.

Major project: With the money we have already raised and money to be raised over the next couple of years, we would like to focus on a major project to work towards as a collaboration between the Friends of the School and the School Board. We will be surveying the students on what they would like to see in their school, and we welcome your input too. Some ideas thus far have been:

- a bike track
- a school van
- a roof over the turf to create an all-weather play, sport and event area
- a playground extension
- drainage of the playing field to make it usable year round

A working group will be formed to put the plan into action once we have settled on a project. Again, there will be a call out for parents, grandparents, friends of the school etc to support this when the time comes.

Acknowledgement: I want to acknowledge and thank Rob and Annie Simpson for creating some great opportunities for our school community to come together for social events and build community spirit. The disco last term was very well supported and they followed this up with a screening of the Rugby World Cup opening game in the media centre, complete with a cooked breakfast. Keep an eye out for the next

opportunity as they are always fun and a great way to meet other families, particularly for parents who work full time and aren't always able to be present at school events during the day.
