Kia ora koutou, whanau

I want to celebrate all the wonderful opportunities our tamariki get to develop leadership in our kura. We develop leadership in many ways and don't just leave this opportunity for Year 7 and 8 students. During the past few learning celebrations, we have seen amazing examples of our tamariki developing their leadership skills. Every student has an opportunity to lead in a variety of ways. Whether this is through supporting others, role modelling or organising. We have students taking the opportunity to take on roles that require organisation, responsibility, and being reliable. We have buddy classes which support our youngest students to be confident to lead the celebrations (leading the celebrations shows incredible confidence). We have students leading activities in the library, sorting sports gear and, what is so impressive, is seeing students of all ages integrating together in a range of play activities. We have had students from Room 6 develop a plan and organise a lunchtime disco. These are leadership skills that all our tamariki get the opportunity to develop.

Last week our Year 8s participated in a day developing Physical Activity Leadership and have now all been up-skilled in how to effectively facilitate physical activities around school. In the next few weeks, they will be developing a schedule of lunchtime events with an opportunity for all students to take part. It is impressive seeing our students' leadership skills shine through when working with students from other schools.

For the past five weeks, we have been making a conscious choice to not have students using digital devices. This decision was made at the end of last year in response to research about the impacts of screen time, and our own anecdotal evidence on students' work habits. While we still get asked daily by students when we'll get the devices back out, there has been some fantastic work being produced in all classes without the aid of technology.

As a staff we are exploring more the use of devices for limited times and for specific purposes. A key element of this is each class having a digital contract and what the expectations will be for the use of devices. We know many of our students engage in social media, we know many engage in online gaming, and we know that students are very good at trying to navigate to areas on the web that they shouldn't during school learning time.

While the government is making noise in the media about teaching an hour of reading, writing and maths, this is not new for us. What is important to note is that reading, writing and maths happens in all of the curriculum areas so we will be continuing to provide science, technology, arts, PE and health all while trying to have our localised curriculum in place to engage our tamariki. What is so impressive with the sample of data here is the high percentage achieving AT or ABOVE the desired curriculum level.
