From the Board

Recently, I attended a webinar hosted by the NZ School Boards Association on the future plans for tackling attendance in our schools. Minister David Seymour, who has been tasked with this role, outlined some of the plans for the coming 12 and 24 months. In short, there will be a new simplified system introduced for January 2025, there are attendance percentage thresholds; indicators to alert community wrap-around services and there will be stronger consequences on parents who enable students to be absent. In the past, school boards have had the responsibility of lodging legal action against parents, but from next year, the Ministry of Education will be leading the prosecutions. Finally, our school board is to have an attendance action plan in place by January 2026. There are still some significant decisions to be announced so I will be interested in where this goes.

Our role forecast for 2025 is pleasingly stable, meaning we will maintain our staffing quota and our students will continue to be well supported by both our teachers and support staff.

At our last board meeting, we discussed our school values and how they fit in with our school culture. The values of self managing, contributing and mindfulness are well understood by our students due to specific teaching and acknowledgement over the past two years. A review of the values will take place early next year.

I am really looking forward to attending our whole school camp - I enjoy seeing our tamariki in a different light, watching strengths emerge, kindness and support of one another, a whole lot of giggling and eyes wide open to new adventures and lifelong memories.

Thank you in advance to our Friends of the School for their funding support to enable these amazing opportunities to happen, and to our staffing team for spending months on the logistics and behind the scenes planning. I look forward to getting to know more of our parent community during this time too.
